Hue Citadel



3 nights Hanoi – 1 night Halong Bay – 1 night overnight train – 2 nights Hue
– 3 nights Hoi An – 2 nights Ho Chi Minh City



Day 1: Hanoi (Mon, 14 Mar) **D**

- Am:** Arrive in Hanoi, which celebrated its 1000th birthday in 2010, and check into the Silk Path Boutique Hotel, a lovely boutique hotel in the heart of old Hanoi.
- Pm:** Take a walking tour through the vibrant old quarter in the afternoon. Walk through Hanoi's '36 Streets' including Medicine, Silk, Silver and Optical Streets, and visit the traditional medicine shops. Visit peaceful Hoan Kiem Lake.
- Eve:** Dinner at Aubergine.

Day 2: Hanoi (Tue, 15 Mar) **B D**

- Am:** Early start to visit Hanoi Flower Market before returning for breakfast. Visit the Temple of Literature, the site of Vietnam's old university, as well as One Pillar Pagoda and Hanoi Opera House.
- Pm:** Visit the National Acupuncture Hospital and examine the use of traditional therapies in eye care.
- Eve:** Welcome dinner at Green Tangerine.

Day 3: Hanoi (Wed, 16 Mar) **B L**

- Am:** Optional early morning coffee by the lake. Visit the Vietnam National Institute of Ophthalmology (VNIO). Learn about the background to health, eye care and the status of optometry in Vietnam. There will also be a discussion on VNIO's refraction and spectacle technical training for optometrists, supported by the Brien Holden Vision Institute.
- Pm:** Have lunch at KOTO, an Australian-Vietnamese based charity, and learn about their inspiring initiatives with street children. Time at leisure.

Day 4: Hanoi / Halong Bay (Thur, 17 Mar) **B L D**

- Am:** Rise early the next day to set off for Halong Bay, where thousands of steep-sided islands tower above the emerald waters as junk boats cruise languidly among them. Board the private Victory Star Junk in time for lunch.
- Pm:** Cruise through beautiful Halong Bay, stopping at limestone caves, with options to swim, kayak or relax on deck. Spend the night in a cabin on the junk.

Day 5: Halong Bay / Hue (Fri, 18 Mar) **B L**

- Am:** Cruise back to port.
- Pm:** See traditional water puppet theatre at Dao Thuc village.
- Eve:** Transfer to the airport for an evening flight to Hue. Check into the historic and elegant Saigon Morin Hotel.

Day 6: Hue (Sat, 19 Mar) **B D**

- Am:** Take a tour of Truc Chi Garden, a museum devoted to the burgeoning art form of truc chi, which builds on and refines the exquisite Vietnamese art of paper crafting.
- Pm:** Visit Minh Mang Tomb, one of the royal tombs of Hue, and the dramatic Khai Dinh Mausoleum.

Eve: Dinner at Y Thao.

Day 7: Hue (Sun, 20 Mar) B D

Am: Take a guided tour of Hue Citadel, which was home to the nation's last royal family. The vast citadel defended the Imperial City itself, its huge outer walls still bearing the scars of battle dating from the Tet Offensive during the Vietnam-American conflict.

Pm: Cruise back to the hotel aboard boat along Hue's Perfume River, with a stop at the elegant Thien Mu Pagoda to see a daily prayer recital.

Eve: Dinner at Moc Vien.

Day 8: Hue / Hoi An (Mon, 21 Mar) B D

Am: Visit the Hue School for the Blind, which provides vocational training to students, and see their low vision unit.

Pm: Take the scenic train from Hue to Danang and continue to charming Hoi An by road. Check into the stylish, luxurious Allegro Hotel and at leisure before dinner.

Day 9: Hoi An (Tue, 22 Mar) B D

Am: Walking tour of the old quarter of Hoi An, once a thriving port popular with European, Chinese and Japanese merchants - a cultural mix still in evidence today.

Pm: At leisure. Hoi An is an excellent place to have one of the local tailors run up a bespoke outfit, shop in the silk market, visit nearby China Beach or simply relax and soak up the atmosphere.

Day 10: Hoi An (Wed, 23 Mar) B L

Am: Take boat across Thu Bon River and visit the village of Kim Bong. Explore some of the surrounding villages and countryside, littered with ancestral tombs and family temples, and discover how the majority of Vietnam's population lives.

Pm: Visit a family-run vegetable and herb farm and sample some of their fresh homegrown ingredients for lunch. Spend the afternoon at leisure or take an optional Vietnamese cookery class.

Day 11: Hoi An / Ho Chi Minh City (Thur, 24 Mar) B D

Am: Transfer to Danang and fly to cosmopolitan Ho Chi Minh City and check into the central, contemporary Liberty Central City Point Hotel.

Pm: Visit the colourful bustle of Ben Thanh market. Continue onto the French era Notre Dame Cathedral, the palatial Central Post Office, Reunification Palace and a local optician, Ngoc Toan Opticians.

Eve: Dinner at Noir, a dining in the dark experience.

Day 12: Ho Chi Minh City (Fri, 25 Mar) B D

Am: Visit Ho Chi Minh City Eye Hospital, home of the first optometry school in Vietnam. Their optometry course is a joint effort between Pham Ngoc Thach University of Medicine, HCMC Eye Hospital and the Brien Holden Vision Institute. Learn of optometry education and the Optometry Development Program. Meet with local optometrists.

Pm: At leisure or options to visit the interesting FITO museum of traditional medicine or the poignant War Museum.

Eve: Farewell dinner at Indochine.

Day 13: Ho Chi Minh City (Sat, 26 Mar) B

Am: At leisure (or take extension to Siem Reap – see below).

Pm: Depart Ho Chin Minh City or take the extension.

Extension to Angkor Wat, Cambodia

26 – 28 March 2022

Cambodia is a nation with a proud ancestry in the form of the Khmer Empire, which at its zenith covered much of modern South East Asia, leaving as its legacy the magnificent structures at Angkor. At its peak Angkor is thought to have contained upwards of a million people, making it the largest city in the world at that time.

Day 13: Ho Chi Minh City / Siem Reap (Sat, 26 Mar)

B D

- Am:** Fly to Siem Reap and transfer to the beautiful boutique Hotel Lotus Blanc.
- Pm:** At leisure.
- Eve:** Dinner at the Foreign Correspondents Club.

Day 14: Siem Reap (Sun, 27 Mar)

B D

- Am:** Early morning visit to Bayon and the romantic ruins of Ta Prohm, still intertwined with enormous tree roots hundreds of years old. Return to the hotel for breakfast before visiting the

Angkor Wat complex, which represents one of humankind's most astonishing architectural achievements.

- Pm:** At leisure to explore the market, the old French Quarter or relax around the pool.
- Eve:** Dinner at Vrioth to enjoy delicious Cambodian food, still less known to Westerners than that of its Thai or Vietnamese neighbours.

Day 15: Siem Reap (Mon, 28 Mar)

B

- Am:** At leisure.
- Pm:** Depart to airport for onward flight or spend more time in Cambodia.
